A New Building for a New Hope

On Wednesday, September 6, 2017, the United Methodist Church of the Resurrection Downtown Campus (RezDT) poured the concrete for their new building located on the Southeast corner of 16th and Grand Avenue in Kansas City, Missouri. RezDT's new construction is the <u>first church to be built in downtown Kansas City in the past 80 years</u>.

As far back as accessible historical records exist, this new location has changed over time from stables to car lots to, most recently, a parking lot. This report provides documentation regarding the history of the plot of land between 17th and 16th, Grand Avenue and McGee Street.

Kansas City History

The City of Kansas City, Missouri, has a rich history. Originally inhabited by the indigenous Native American Kaw or Kansa tribe,¹ the area which would become Kansas City was first scouted by the Western explorers Capt. Meriwether Lewis and Lt. William Clark in June 1804.²

Since the start of the 18th century, many people made the town of Kansas their home. Kansas City, Missouri, was incorporated in 1850. The City's incorporation was several years before the Territory of Kansas was established in 1864. Through the years, Kansas City, being an important rail city, ballooned to its current size.

Some significant developments during this time were the building of Union Station in 1914, <u>Liberty Memorial in the mid-1920s</u>, and the <u>Power & Light Building in 1936</u>.

Methodism. In 1936, William Miles Chick founded the first Methodist church in Kansas City in 1836. Rev. Chick originally moved from Virginia area to the Kansas City area in 1936.³ Rev. Chick and his wife, <u>Anne Eliza Chick</u>, helped grow this Methodist society into a church: the Fifth Street Methodist Church. William and <u>Anne Chick</u>'s Fifth Street Methodist church was located at Fifth and Walnut, close to what is now the Opera House Coffee & Food Emporium.

In 1852, <u>Dr. Nathan Scarritt with his wife, Martha Matilda Chick Scarritt</u>, became the first regular pastor at the Fifth Street Church. <u>Dr. Nathan Scarritt</u> was born in Illinois in 1921.⁴ He married William and Anne Chick's daughter, Martha, in the spring of 1950. Dr. Scarritt conduct missionary work to the <u>Native America tribes</u> in the area, including

the Shawnee, Delaware, and Wyandotte tribes. He and his family of six children lived in an L-shaped house in Westport at 4038 Central Street, which is now on the National Registry of Historical Places. Dr. Scarritt died in 1890, having made a considerable impact to Methodism in the area.

Among the other historical Methodist churches were the <u>Walnut Street Methodist</u> <u>Church</u> and the <u>Country Club church</u>. The Walnut Street church was established because of an outgrowth in the Fifth Street Church. The Country Club church, located at 57th and Wornell, help bring Methodism further south in Kansas City.

New RezDT Location. As the city continued to expand, the land between 16th and 17th street, McGee street and Grand avenue, has always been associated with Kansas City's history. Around the turn of the 19th century, the plot of land was home to saddleries, harness makers, and horse shoers.

After Henry Ford and 1908, cars became increasingly more commonplace. Henry Hunt Horse shoer transitioned to Stevenson Motor Company and <u>United States Tire</u> <u>Company</u>. By 1917, the land was a potpourri of various businesses. Joseph S. Lerner, a Russian immigrant, opened one of his Vogue ladies clothes shop at 1617 Grand Ave, the approximate location of the alter.


Over the subsequent years following World War II, the land continued to be used by automotive shops and, increasingly, parking lots. In the mid-1950s, <u>Sullivan Chevrolet</u> sold new and used vehicles at 1600 McGee, even giving <u>away tokens</u>. Places like <u>Whitaker Battery</u> became mainstays in the neighborhood.

While most of the plot of land for the new location was not photographed with the exception of in 1940, there are still several photos around the location through the years:


- The view from the corner of 17th and Grand looking Southeast in 1949, following a snowstorm;
- Grand from 18th, facing the North in April 1894;
- Grand at 17th, looking North in 1895;
- The Kansas City Star building in 1905;
- The Kansas City downtown in 1926;
- The corner of Grand and Pershing, looking North in 1927;
- The Kansas City Star building, circa 1928;
- The current McGee location of the church as viewed in 1940; and,
- Kansas City downtown in 1950.

In 2006, the Kansas City Star opened up their publication center at the southeast corner of Truman and McGee. By this time, most of the block was already a parking lot.

Sanborn Maps were produced to help with fire and insurance claims. This map was made between $\underline{1896}$ and $\underline{1907}$.
